



GREAT MORMON TABERNACLE.









CARMICHAEL'S CUT, GRANITE CANON.








LARAMIE MACHINE SHOPS, FROM THE SOUTHWEST.



SNOW AND TIMBER LINE, LARAMIE MOUNTAINS.


This line is sixty miles south of Laramie City. The mountains are covered with eternal snow. Pine, balsam, tamarack, and cottonwood are found at this point.

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


This line is sixty miles south of Laramie City. The mountains are covered with eternal snow. Pine, balsam, tamarack, and cottonwood are found at this point.
